

Apartment Information

The apartments are set within the distinctive Rope Walks area, East Village in Liverpool City Centre. Within the East Village complex are restaurants such as 'Sapporo Teppanyaki' (Japanese style food), 'Il Forno' (Italian), 'Mayur' (Indian) and 'Savina' (Mexican). They are all situated on the main road called Duke Street which is the front entrance to the East Village complex, the secure underground car park can be found on the side of East village on Kent Street, if travelling from the top of Duke Street take a left after the Indian Restaurant and car park is located on the left hand side, you



will need a security fob to enter into the underground.

Across the road past Duke Street you come to top of Bold Street where the shops start, walking down Bold Street leads you directly down to Church Street and to the main shopping district where you will find household names such as Primark, M & S, Burtons, and many more. Alternatively you can walk down Duke Street until you come to the new one billion pound Capital of Culture redevelopment shopping centre called Liverpool 1 due to be completed in the forthcoming months.



East Village also borders China Town, the oldest in Europe and home to the largest Chinese archway (14 metres high) in the western world and it stands in the shadow of the largest Gothic Revival Cathedral in Britain, the monumental Cathedral Church of Christ, within the China town area you will find several restaurants with the 'New Capital' being a popular destination.

The Albert Dock is set on the outskirts of the city centre and is 5-10 minutes walk from the apartments and can be seen from one of the apartments facing

the waterfront. The apartments are located in Staten Court and Tradewind Square, in the heart of Liverpool's centre, nestled between the main retail quarter and the waterfront. This award winning development, completed in 2003, set a benchmark for urban design through exciting, innovative architecture, which also remains true to its historical and cultural legacy. New York is reflected within the scheme affirming the synergy between these two cities.

Next to the Albert Dock located on the Kings Dock is the Liverpool Echo Arena home to many events including WWE, Boyzone, Westlife, Premier League Darts, and many others, as well as the new Convention Centre located directly next to the Echo Arena.



Rope Walks is part of UNESCO's World Heritage Site owing to its prominence in Liverpool's rich shipping heritage. Historically, the Duke Street area, due to its proximity to the Dock, was at the forefront of the first trading boom in Liverpool following the opening in 1715 of the Old Dock (Steers Dock) on the site of the current Canning Place.

The long, narrow streets were at one time used to bind ropes for Liverpool's maritime industry and are still the defining characteristic of the area. To make way for these roperies the surrounding fields were developed in the early 19th Century with the streets often named after the owners of the land, such as Mr Seel, Mr Colquitt and Mr Fleetwood (giving part of his name to both Fleet Street and Wood Street).
